Political Policy Scholarships and Bursaries

1 Facts

Old

- 1. The cost of a university education has increased.
- 2. This cost increase poses a great disincentive to accessing a university education, as well as a considerable barrier to finishing a degree.
- 3. Scholarships and bursaries are an integral part of the student finance system, without which motivated and outstanding individuals could not afford a university education.
- 4. The University of Alberta should not only aim to attract talented students, but demonstrate a commitment to realizing the full potential of current undergraduate students.
- 5. Financial need can be detrimental to academic and extracurricular student achievement by diverting student focus and effort to employment.
- 6. The current scholarship and bursaries applications process is inefficient and time consuming.

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2 Resolutions

- The Students' Union shall lobby the University of Alberta to increase the number and value of awards granted to continuing undergraduate students in order to be consistent with the number and value of entrance awards.
- The Students' Union shall lobby the University of Alberta and the Government of Alberta to increase the relative and absolute amounts of scholarships and bursaries that are awarded based on the students' financial need and/or involvement.
- The Students' Union pursue a single point of entry to the scholarship and bursaries application process.
- 4. The Students' Union shall advocate that the University of Alberta and the Government of Alberta provide awards of merit based on leadership and community involvement, as well as scholarships based on academics.

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- 3. The Students' Union shall work towards tailoring the SU awards to a needs-based model to reward not only excellence in leadership and academics, but also to those who need financial support the most.
- The Students' Union pursue a single point of entry to the scholarship and bursaries application process.
- The Students' Union shall advocate that the University of Alberta and the Government of Alberta provide awards of merit based on leadership and community involvement, as well

KLOOSTER: Inquired into whether the University has a choice as to whether they accept the Chicago Principles for promoting free expression as part of an Alberta Government directive for universities to implement freedom of speech policies.

LEY: Responded in the negative. Clarified, however, that the University has a choice in what its policy includes as regards enforcement and clarification provisions.

KLOOSTER: Inquired into whether the University will be penalized for failing to implement its freedom of speech policy by October 15th.

AGARWAL: Responded in the negative. Emphasised that the University is committed to thoroughly consulting its students and other stakeholders.

SUNDAY: Inquired, to the chair of Bylaw Committee, as to when Bylaw 100 and Bylaw 100 Schedule B will be updated to reflect the current state of affairs.

DRAPER: Responded that the Committee is actively improving and updating bylaws and change will occur soon.

BADESHA: Inquired, to the President, as to what consultations have been completed on the Student Charter of Rights

BHATNAGAR: Responded that she plans to consult with the University President, Provost, General Faculties Council, Vice-President for Learning and Programs, Academic Standards Committee, Dean of Students, Office of Human Rights and Safe Disclosure, and Council of Faculty Associations.

SUNDAY: Inquired, to the Vice-President Operations and Finance, as to whether there have been funds set aside for the Aboriginal Relations & Reconciliation Committee budget and for advancing the ARRC Recommendations.

STATT: Responded that the budgeting process is underway.

DRAPER: Inquired, to the Vice-President Operations and Finance, as to whether the renovation of Dewey's will result in changes to its menu.

STATT: Responded in the affirmative. Noted that, in addition, there will be changes in the processes for ordering food.

VARGAS ALBA: Inquired, to the Vice-President Academic, as to what measures he will take to ensure that his update reports are submitted on-time in future.

AGARWAL: Responded that his report was late as he was on vacation and will ensure this does not occur again.

VARGAS ALBA: Inquired, to the Vice-President Student Life, as to what measures he will take to ensure that his update reports are submitted on-time in future.

SUNDAY MOVED to amend the Bill 4(a) to read that "A reference question allows DIE board the ability to provide opinions on the scope of Students' Union policies, actions, decisions and events without the need for a dispute to be brought to the board."

<u>Definition</u>: Verbal and nonverbal communication toward an intended audience

What is your message?

What is the goal of the communication?

Is the knowledge you're transferring well organized?

What words are you using?

Learn your material (but not too well)





Preparing for Q&A

Make a list of potential questions

"I'm not sure, but..."

Know where to direct question you don't have the answer to

Be Calm

Pause if you have to gather your thoughts

Always be positive

Believe that you can find the answer, even if you don't know it yet

Mechanics for speech delivery

Personality

Confidence is **Key**

Set expectations ahead of time

Know your material, and don't let others interrupt

Portray through your body language/stage use

Be decisive, in control and energetic!

Authenticity matters

Embrace your own communication style and own it

Pro tip: watch the audience's body language


